LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

Introduction and Background

As announced in the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE)'s <u>April 28, 2021 broadcast</u>, in March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal <u>American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act</u>, Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families. Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Pursuant to those requirements, LEAs must submit to the NJDOE and post on their website their Safe Return Plans by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE intends to make LEA ARP ESSER Fund applications available in EWEG on May 24, 2021 and LEAs will submit their Safe Return Plans to the NJDOE via EWEG. To assist LEAs with the development of their Safe Return Plans, the NJDOE is providing the following template.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan. The questions in the template below will be included in the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG. LEAs will submit responses to the questions within the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE hopes that this template will allow LEAs to effectively plan for that submission and to easily post the information to their websites as required by the ARP Act.

Note that on May 17, 2021, Governor Murphy <u>announced</u> that upon the conclusion of the 2020-2021 school year, portions of Executive Order 175 allowing remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as they were prior to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The NJDOE and New Jersey Department of Health will share additional information regarding State requirements or guidance for health and safety protocols for the 2021-2022 school year as it becomes available.

1. Maintaining Health and Safety

A. Universal and correct wearing of masks

As per Governor Murphy's announcement on February 7, 2022, the Greater Brunswick Charter School made the wearing of masks in school optional for all students, staff, outside providers, and visitors regardless of vaccination status starting in March, 2022. Any student, staff member, outside provider, or visitor may continue to wear a mask if they choose. The use of masks will be based on the Governor's Executive Orders and New Jersey Department of Health guidance. Should there be a change in either, the School will adjust its practices accordingly.

B. Physical distancing (including use of cohorts/podding)

Based on the current data and the guidance issued by the NJ Department of Health, the School is not currently implementing physical distancing protocols. The School will adjust its practices accordingly if there are changes to the guidance issued.

C. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette

The School will continue to promote practices that reduce the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory illnesses, such as frequent handwashing and respiratory etiquette. Signs will be displayed around school building to remind staff and students to wash hands frequently. Soap and/or hand sanitizer are available in all classrooms, bathrooms, offices, and common areas. In limited cases, an alcohol-based sanitizer or alcohol-based wipes will be used as alternatives to hand washing with soap and water if a sink is not available.

D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation

The School will adhere to current required cleaning practices and procedures to maintain a healthy environment. The School has developed a schedule and process to allow for routine cleaning and disinfecting. All spaces will continue to be cleaned daily by the custodial department. In order to maintain appropriate air quality standards, univent filters will be changed three times a year. Filters for A/C units will be maintained and changed according to manufacturer recommendations. The School has installed and maintains air purification units in confined

classroom spaces.

E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments

Based on the current data available and guidance issued by the CDC, the School will no longer implement contact tracing protocols. The School will adjust its practices accordingly if there are changes to the guidance issued by the NJ Department of Health.

F. Diagnostic and screening testing

Parents/guardians are strongly encouraged to monitor their children for signs of illness every day and keep their children home if they are feeling ill. As per the guidance issued by the NJ Department of Health, parents and students are expected to follow the guidance for exposure and positive cases. The same protocol applies to employees. Employees are expected to monitor their symptoms and not report to work if they are feeling ill. This information is subject to change based on updated guidance.

G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible.

The School collaborated frequently with local health department officials to remain informed of vaccination sites and offerings and distributed this information to parents, students and staff.

H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies.

Greater Brunswick Charter School will follow guidelines for accommodations for children with disabilities as established by the NJ Department of Health, NJ Department of Education, as well as any relevant legislation or executive orders signed by the Governor of New Jersey for all students, educators, and other staff. This includes addressing individual student needs through IEPs, 504 Plans, individual medical plans, and other existing mechanisms as needed to ensure access to educational services for all eligible students.

2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

• Greater Brunswick Charter School has resumed its full day instructional program and provides all services available to address students' academic, social, and behavioral needs. A number of programs are offered to address student mental health and wellness such as counseling services, integrating social-emotional learning and mindfulness exercises throughout the school day, and social group exercises for elementary students. Eligible students receive free and reduced lunch, even in the event of a school closure. Grant funds (ESSER, ARP ESSER, Title I) are allocated to provide students with additional academic and social-emotional support through during and extended school day activities

The Greater Brunswick Charter School District sought public comment as follows:

• The School has and will arrange professional development opportunities for staff so that they are prepared to meet the social, emotional, health, and academic needs of all students. Our Instructional Coaches and Technology Specialist provides ongoing support to administrators, teachers, and staff. Technical assistance is always available to staff.
